A Summer of Great Family-Friendly Events Begins Now!

Great family-friendly summer events are a hallmark of summer in Wilsonville. The City is hosting or sponsoring several this year, a list headlined by the annual end-of-summer concert bash — Party in the Park — on Thursday, Aug. 21.

Round up your friends and family, and enjoy the great outdoors at some of Wilsonville’s best gathering places this summer.

June

June 7: The City’s **Pride Celebration**, which debuted last year, returns on Saturday, June 7, 2-4 pm (see article below).

June 19: Wilsonville’s fifth annual **Juneteenth Celebration** takes place at Town Center Park, 5-7:30 pm, on Thursday, June 19. This year’s celebration features a keynote address by Tai Harden-Moore, remarks from the Wilsonville High School Black Student Union, music, activities, giveaways, and more. Food is available (in limited supply). See page 8 for more information.

June 28: A **Korean War Remembrance Ceremony** takes place at 10 am at Town Center Park’s Korean War Memorial on Saturday, June 28, to recognize the anniversary of the beginning of the Korean War, in 1950 and honor Korean War veterans. Attendees should pay a visit to the new Korean War Memorial Interpretive Center.

July

July 4: The annual **Fourth of July Laser Light Show** takes place at Town Center Park on Friday, July 4. This safe, inclusive alternative to traditional fireworks features a light show set to music. New this year: live music! Singer/songwriter Tiffany Bird performs at 8 pm; the lasers fly when darkness falls (about 10 pm). Bring blankets and lawn chairs.

July 19: The annual **Wilsonville Skate Jam** is back at the skate spot at Lower Memorial Park. The shredding begins at 1 pm on Saturday, July 19. Presented by the Wilsonville Skate Association, the community focused afternoon includes Kona Ice, jam sessions, giveaways, a prize raffle and other surprises.

July 25: The Friday night **Movies in the Park** series is back with the first of three family-friendly flicks, projected on an inflatable outdoor screen. Movies begin at dusk (times vary). Bring short lawn-chairs,

Mayor’s Message

With Our Unique Geography Comes Great Opportunity

Some of Wilsonville’s appeal to those who live and work here is the city’s unique proximity to so much of what Oregon offers. We’re fortunate to be located on the banks of the historic Willamette River and in easy proximity to wine country, our state capital, the agricultural bounty of French Prairie, tax-free shopping opportunities and the many cultural attractions of the greater Portland area.



Truly, we exist in the heart of the region, with plentiful access to outdoor recreation, arts and culture, great Oregon agricultural products, fine dining, and opportunities to explore.

This makes Wilsonville a great base from which to explore northwest Oregon. Our city has the most hotel rooms in the South Portland and North Willamette Valley region, and our ExploreWilsonville.com website provides a wealth of information about nearby destinations.

Our unique geography is the basis of the new Tourism Development Strategy (TDS), a recently adopted 10-year plan that succeeds the City’s first such effort from 2014. During the past decade, business and travel markets have changed dramatically, spurred by the pandemic, the explosion of virtual business meetings and online shopping, and other changes in traveler preferences.

Our TDS provides an aspirational road map, with goals and strategies to promote local businesses and develop new attractions that make Wilsonville a more enticing destination for visitors.

The 2025-2035 Tourism Development Strategy focuses on three distinct areas of our community:

- **Infrastructure and built environment**, including investment in Town Center, growth of transportation options, and enhanced access to the Willamette River.
- **Developing more activities for visitors**, including sports, outdoor recreation, and arts, culture and heritage events.
- **Diversifying and expanding lodging options**, enhancing food and beverage offerings, and developing a signature citywide event to support restaurateurs, retailers and hoteliers.

This plan, which complements the City’s existing master plans, is a vision leading Wilsonville toward a more vibrant tomorrow that celebrates our history, welcomes visitors, and bolsters our local economy. It was developed in partnership with our Tourism Promotion Committee and Whereabout, a nationally recognized destination futures outfit that spoke to community stakeholders and completed an on-site assessment that helped define the vision and actionable strategies to bring it to life.

I express my gratitude here for the residents, business owners, and visitors whose voices have informed the plan, and to our tourism planning team for their guidance and leadership.

City Celebrates Pride Month on June 7 with New Mural, Reception

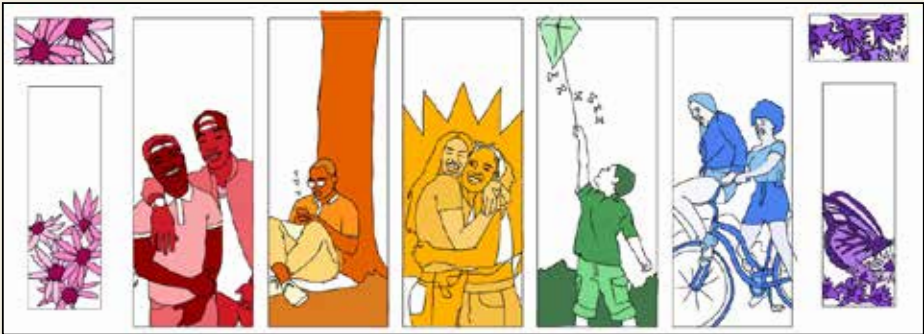
In June, the City is once again recognizing Pride Month with a temporary mural on the glass exterior of the Parks and Recreation Administration Building (29600 SW Park Place) and a community celebration.

The celebration takes place on Saturday, June 7, from 2-4 pm at the mural, which has been commissioned to provide visual representation to uplift, recognize and celebrate members of Wilsonville’s LGBTQIA+ community. It will remain visible throughout the month.

Portland artist Daren Todd, the mural’s designer, enjoys “funky abstract designs” and “making larger-than-life sized artworks and installations designed to inspire.” He has recently completed work for the Portland Trail Blazers and the Portland Streetcar.

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Dump Bulky Waste on June 21

The City’s popular Bulky Waste Day takes place on Saturday, June 21, 9 am-1 pm, at Republic Services (10295 SW Ridder Rd.) in Wilsonville.

This year, the City and Republic Services are mitigating challenges in place because of construction taking place on Ridder Rd. to underground a segment of water pipeline.

Any traffic controls necessary for this event will be communicated in more detail via the City’s social media channels.

Twice each year, Bulky Waste Day provides Wilsonville residents with an opportunity to conveniently dispose of large or unusual items that cannot be picked up curbside. Proof of residence is required.

In lieu of charging participants, organizers request that participants provide a cash donation on site to support the work of Wilsonville Community Sharing, the community’s local food bank.

Volunteers from the Wilsonville Rotary are picking up bulky waste, by request, from a limited number of residents who wouldn’t otherwise be able to participate. Bulky Waste pickup can be requested online at bit.ly/BW_pickup

Pipeline Project Finishing at 95th, Moving to Ridder Rd.

The Willamette Water Supply Program (WWSP) is now undertaking a project to underground the last Wilsonville segment of its 30-mile regional water pipeline project.

Work to install 66-inch water pipeline beneath SW Ridder Rd., between SW 95th Avenue and Garden Acres Road, was scheduled to have begun by late May. This closure requires the closure of Ridder Rd. for several months because of challenging construction and limited space.

Businesses are remaining open, with traffic being detoured away from the construction area. Motorists should anticipate increased congestion and/or traffic delays on nearby roadways and consider alternate routes.

Construction is being completed in close coordination with the City, Portland General Electric, Bonneville Power Administration, and other utilities, as well as neighboring property owners and businesses.

Prior to moving to Ridder Rd., WWSP crews were completing permanent resurfacing and road improvements along SW 95th Ave. to re-open the road to two-way traffic between Boeckman Rd. and Ridder Rd.

Since 2020, the WWSP has been aiming toward the completion of 3.3-miles of pipeline installation in Wilsonville, a small segment of a 30-mile project area that extends from the Willamette River Water Treatment Plant (WRWTP) to the cities of Sherwood, Hillsboro, and Beaverton.

This extensive project to deliver Willamette River water to neighboring communities and add resiliency to the region’s water systems is being funded by ratepayers in Beaverton and Hillsboro. For Wilsonville’s role in facilitating/accommodating the project, it negotiated \$17 million, as well as seismic upgrades at the WRWTP, and several improvements to local roadways and parks impacted by the project.

Tooze Rd. Resurfacing Rescheduled; Set to Be Completed This Month

Work to repave the portions of Tooze Rd. impacted by the installation of a new water transmission main to feed the Westside Reservoir incurred delays.


The new anticipated starting date at press time was June 2, with work continuing for about two weeks.

The work area begins at the intersection of Tooze Rd. and Westfall Rd. and continues north on Tooze to the reservoir site (12771 SW Tooze Rd.).

During construction, traffic is limited to one lane, with flaggers scheduled to be present around the clock to safely direct vehicles. Paving activities are limited to daytime work hours.

Updates to timeline or impacts will be posted as necessary at wilsonvilleoregon.gov/reservoir.

Safe Buildings Minimize the Impact of Many Disasters

The City celebrated Building Safety Month in May, but the safety of the built environment is a year-round endeavor for Wilsonville’s building inspectors.

Inspectors play a crucial role in community preparedness. Their work can minimize the loss of lives and property that accompany severe earthquakes, floods, wildfires and other disasters that wreak havoc on communities.

This month, Wilsonville Ready shines a light on the role our building inspectors play, and how property owners can support their work to build and maintain safe structures.

The Role of a Building Inspector

Risk Assessment: Building inspections assess the structural integrity of buildings and identify potential vulnerabilities. When inspectors identify potential risks, it allows property owners to take preventative measures to reinforce weak areas. By addressing structural issues, fire hazards, and other safety concerns, property owners can reduce the risk of damage or minimize that damage during disasters.

Code Compliance: Proper design and construction techniques are vital in regions prone to natural disasters. Inspectors ensure that construction and renovation projects adhere to local building codes, which include provisions for disaster resistance. This work ensures safer structures.

Education: Inspectors play an educational role, informing property owners and builders about best practices in disaster preparedness.

Emergency Response: In the event of a disaster, building inspectors may collaborate with emergency responders to assess the safety of structures and determine if they are habitable.

Building inspectors dedicate their professional life to making sure our structures are as resilient and safe as possible. They play an indispensable role in pre-



paredness by ensuring that developers and property owners adhere to safety standards and comply with local building codes.

Supporting Safe Structures at Home

Inspectors can’t have eyes everywhere. There are critical steps property owners should take to support safe structures.

- Get a permit! Unpermitted work is unlawful and potentially unsafe. Inspections on altered structures ensure their safety and structural integrity.
- Maintain defensible space. Clear brush, leaves, and flammable debris, and firewood from within 30 feet from home. Use fire-resistant materials for decks, siding, and other projects.
- Bolt large, heavy items. Mount bookshelves, water heaters, etc., to the wall to avoid them becoming a hazard in the event of an earthquake.
- Use smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. These should be installed in all bedrooms and near fuel-burning appliances. Test these devices monthly and change batteries yearly.

Building safety is an indispensable part of disaster preparedness. Together, building inspectors and property owners can significantly reduce the impact of natural disasters on communities.

\$100,000 Allocated to Fund Five New Community Projects

The Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Committee, which oversees local implementation of the Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Program, has allocated about \$100,000 to fund five community improvement projects.

This annual program is funded by a per-ton fee charged by Metro regional government on solid-waste transfer stations located in communities throughout the greater Portland region.

The Community Enhancement Committee annually reviews projects or programs nominated by the public and members of City boards and commissions. Funding is allocated to projects that meet program criteria. Awards are approved by the City Council.

Recipients for the upcoming fiscal year include:

- \$41,905 to Heart of the City to complete a building safety project.
- \$27,745 to the City’s Parks and Recreation department to develop wayfinding signage for pedestrians at Memorial Park.
- \$11,350 to Wilsonville Community Sharing to help fund its upcoming relocation to the Vuela building at Wilsonville Transit Center.
- \$10,000 to Charbonneau Community Foundation for a landscaping project.
- \$8,650 to the City’s Natural Resources Department for a Community Connection to Wildlife project.

The next project cycle gets underway in early 2026 to seek new proposals from community groups for the 2026-27 fiscal year.

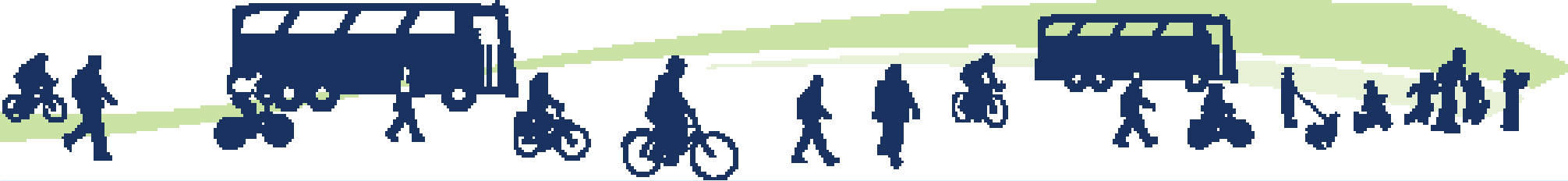

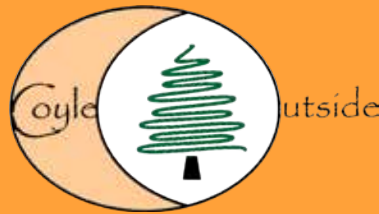

POLICE CHIEF’S CORNER

A Well-Deserved Honor for an Officer With a Big Heart

It is my privilege to take a moment to recognize one of our finest, longtime Wilsonville Patrol Sergeant Jason Ritter, who has dedicated nearly 30 years of his life to protecting and serving. The heart, integrity, and unwavering commitment he brings to everything he does — both in and out of uniform — truly sets him apart.

Jason joined the Clackamas County Sheriff’s Office in 2003, bringing with him a strong foundation in law enforcement, a deep understanding of community needs, and a passion for helping others. Since then, he has played a pivotal role in some of the most critical and sensitive investigations involving child abuse, domestic violence, and human trafficking.

His work to ensure the safety of our youth has earned Sgt. Ritter the Healing Heart Award, presented recently at the Oregon Child Abuse & Human Trafficking Summit in Portland.

This recognition is no surprise to those who know him. Jason’s name belongs at the top of the list when it comes to supporting child advocacy through

leadership, action, and vision. Guided by a trauma-informed, victim-centered approach, Sgt. Ritter prioritizes the safety and dignity of survivors while holding offenders accountable.

Sgt. Ritter’s impact doesn’t stop at the end of a shift. His commitment to the well-being of children and families extends far into his own community — where many know him simply as Coach Ritter. City Briefs

Grant Programs Allocate \$35,000+ to Support Local Programs, Events

Through two annual grant programs, the City of Wilsonville recently awarded more than \$35,000 in funding to support local programs, events and attractions that bring the community together and attract visitors to Wilsonville.

Community Cultural Events and Programs

Each year, the Community Cultural Events and Programs (CCEP) provides up to \$25,000 from the City’s general fund to spark participation in local cultural programming. The program supports local non-profits in the development of projects, programs, and/or events that promote arts, culture, history and heritage as well as local festivals and community events.

The following CCEP Grant allocations were recommended by the Arts, Culture and Heritage Commission and approved by the City Council:

- **The Charbonneau Arts Association**, \$10,000 for the Wilsonville Music Festival at Charbonneau
- **Wilsonville Rotary Foundation**, \$8,000 to support the 2025 Summer Concert Series
- **Wilsonville STAGE**, \$3,000 for “pop up” performances

The next submission deadline for CCEP Grant proposals is Friday, Nov. 14.

Community Opportunity Grant

The Community Opportunity Grant program provides up to \$25,000 each year from the City’s general fund to support projects and services that promote education, diversity, arts, or community involvement within Wilsonville.

Business License Renewals, Fees Due to City By June 30

City Code requires all businesses located in or working in the city limits to obtain a business license, including home-based businesses and door-to-door solicitation permits.

The City’s business license renewal period occurs each June; business licenses expire annually on June 30. To expedite renewals, the City mailed out business license renewal forms in mid-May. If you have not received yours, please contact the business license department.

Renewing a business license is an easy three-step process:

1. **Complete the information** at the top of the form.
2. **Calculate the amount due** according to the fee schedule.

3. Insert the signed and dated form with the fee in the return envelope and **mail back or place in the drop box at City Hall.**

Once the renewal is processed, a new license is issued, and is mailed to the business for display.

Backflow Prevention Testing Reminders Mailed to Homeowners

Having your backflow assembly tested each year is an important step in keeping Wilsonville’s water supply safe and free from contaminants.

Backflow occurs when contaminated water flows backwards into a clean water supply. There are many ways backflow can occur, whether from irrigation systems, manufacturing processes, or even hot tubs. Backflow prevention assemblies are designed to prevent this backflow of contaminated water. They can be installed to protect entire premises, or individual connections to the water supply.

The majority of backflow prevention assemblies used in Wilsonville protect the entire premises. The assembly is installed between the connection to the City water supply and the home or business to protect City water.

In accordance with the Oregon Administrative Rules, the City requires that all installed backflow prevention assemblies be tested every 12 months. If a backflow device fails and/or needs replacing, testing is required upon the completion of repairs or installation of a new device. The City’s compliance with these regulations is monitored by the Oregon Health Authority’s Public Health Division.

Homeowners have been reminded by mail to schedule mandatory backflow testing with a state-certified tester, who will submit your results to the City on your behalf.

Firework Safety: Keep Celebrations Safe, Supervised, and Legal

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue offers firework safety tips to ensure you have a safe Fourth of July holiday.

Oregon law bans fireworks that fly, explode, or travel on the ground more than six feet — this includes bottle rockets, roman candles, firecrackers, and M80s. If you intend to use fireworks, keep them legal and safe.

Fireworks purchased by mail order or in the state of Washington or at a Native American reservation may be illegal here. To be legal, purchase fireworks at a licensed Oregon firework stand.

Even legal fireworks aren’t always 100 percent safe. Sparklers, for example, can reach temperatures of 1,200 degrees (wood burns at 575 degrees; glass melts at 900 degrees), according to the National Fire Protection Association.

Fireworks are dangerous and can cause injuries and burns. To ensure safety:

- Supervise children at all times. Only adults should light or handle fireworks.
- Have a hose nearby in case of fire and place “spent” fireworks in a metal bucket with water.
- Use fireworks outdoors on a paved surface, away from buildings, vehicles, and vegetation.
- Never try to re-light a “dud.”
- Never point or throw fireworks at people, pets, or buildings.
- Never alter fireworks or make your own.
- Store fireworks, matches, and lighters out of the reach of children.



Reporting firework incidents

To report a fire or medical emergency, call 9-1-1. To report a nuisance or concern about illegal fireworks, call the non-emergency number, 503-629-0111. These situations will be logged, passed on to local law enforcement, and responded to as resources allow.

Misusing fireworks can be costly

Law enforcement agencies enforce criminal laws related to the use of illegal fireworks in Oregon.

Under Oregon law, officers can seize illegal fireworks and issue criminal citations, including reckless burning, criminal mischief, reckless endangerment, and more with fines up to \$500 per violation. People can also be held civilly liable for damages resulting from improper use of any fireworks — legal or illegal.

City Council to Consider Adoption of Housing Our Future Project on June 2

The Housing Our Future project, which ensures compliance with State housing planning goals, inventories the City’s buildable residential land and details actions that could be taken over the next six years in a Housing Production Strategy (HPS) to support local housing needs.

Once adopted, the project’s Housing Needs and Capacity Analysis (HNCA) will replace the 2014 Wilsonville Residential Land Study as the City’s guiding document for housing planning. The HNCA estimates the City’s ability to support anticipated

household growth over the next 20 years and identifies unmet housing need in Wilsonville.

On Monday, June 2, at 7 pm, the City Council is scheduled to hold a public hearing to consider the plan’s adoption if it is recommended by the Planning Commission.

In Memoriam: Sen. Aaron Woods, 1949-2025

The City joins the many family members, friends, and peers mourning the mid-April passing of District 13 State Senator Aaron Woods, a long-time Wilsonville resident.

A Chicago native, Woods was a six-year veteran of the U.S. Army before relocating to Oregon to work in the private sector with Tektronix and Xerox.

Woods’ record of public service to Wilsonville includes membership in the Civics Academy, a six-year stint on the City’s Development Review Board (2013-2018) and three years on the Planning Commission (2020-2022) before his election to the State legislature. He also served on the board of Clackamas Community College until shortly before succumbing to cancer.


In the Oregon Senate, Woods emerged as a policy expert on technology, serving as co-chair of the Joint Committee on Information Manage-

ment and Technology. He was a fierce advocate for the widespread availability of broadband internet access.

“Not having access to low-cost internet services puts people at a disadvantage to being active participants in modern life,” said Woods on his campaign website. “The digital divide makes it difficult for students, job searchers, and workers because so many of today’s transactions and interactions take place, sometimes exclusively, online.

Woods was a justice advocate. He aided in the City’s establishment of a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, and was a co-founder of the Wilsonville Alliance for Inclusive Communities (WAIC).

Woods was predeceased by his wife Shirley, and is survived by a family that includes five children and their families in Colorado.

Three Artists Named Finalists for Public Art Project

The 2020 Arts, Culture, and Heritage Strategy (ACHS) has guided the City’s work to cultivate a sustainable, long-term plan to satisfy the community’s aspirations for a vibrant cultural scene.

Public outreach conducted during development of the ACHS revealed that public art is valued as a significant cultural asset. Pursuing public art has been a priority of the Arts, Culture, and Heritage Commission (ACHC) since its inception in 2022.

The City has since adopted a Public Art Policy and guidelines which have already yielded a mural at the Memorial Park Skatepark and the recent “heARTs of Wilsonville: Many Cultures, One Heart” project that features 10 hand-painted fiberglass hearts on display throughout Wilsonville.

The ACHC’s most recent pursuit has been to identify a preferred artist to create a sculpture for permanent display at Boones Ferry Park with a project’s theme ‘Essence of the River.’

A Request for Qualifications (RFQ) issued by the City in December sought artists qualified to create “artwork/s (that) celebrates and pulls inspiration from the river and surrounding natural areas in the park. The artwork(s) should be site-specific and engaging for users of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities.” The RFQ identified three potential locations for art within the park; artists may focus on one or multiple.

The RFQ yielded an astonishing response from more than 150 talented artists nationwide.

“Unlike many of the City’s existing public art pieces, purchased after they were completed, we’re now engaged in a process that provides artists an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the community and park, and to create proposals specific to this distinct theme and place,” said Erika Valentine, the City’s Arts and Culture Program Coordinator.

This collaborative process of placemaking, Valentine explained, leads to more vibrant, public spaces.

It gives visitors a stronger connection to the art, the park, and to Wilsonville.

Narrowing 150 submissions to three

Members of the ACHC and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board reviewed eligible applications and selected 10 finalists. The entire nine-member ACHC reviewed applications from each finalist (including narrative responses and images of previous work) to identify three artists to submit design proposals. They are Pete Beeman, Todji Kurtzman, and the artist team of Lin McJunkin and Milo White.

Each will visit the park with City staff prior to beginning their proposal, which must be completed by August 25. Proposals will be reviewed by the ACHC and relevant stakeholders at a public meeting this fall, and the preferred artist will be selected.

To inform their creations, the artists are soliciting input from the community . Results of a short public survey, available now on “Let’s Talk, Wilsonville!” will be shared with each artist. Take the survey by Monday, June 23 at letstalkwilsonville.com/bfpark_art

Oregon law requires that a legislative vacancy be filled by county commissioners representing the district in which the vacancy exists. Washington, Clackamas and Yamhill boards of county commissioners held a joint session on May 7, at which they expressed near unanimous support for Neron, a member of the Oregon Legislature since 2019 as the representative to Oregon House District 26, which includes Wilsonville.
