

Wilsonville Town Center: A Vision for Our Future

Dear Neighbors,

I am honored to have recently stepped into the role of City Manager. Although I am new in this role, I have been fortunate to live and work in this community for nearly 20 years. I feel a strong personal connection to what we have built together and to the future we are shaping.

As both a resident and your City Manager, I am closely engaged in the details of the Town Center Plan and what this vision means for our community. I am excited about the possibilities it presents including inviting gathering places and expanded dining and retail options.

At the same time, I know how important it is to be thoughtful and balanced in our approach. Housing, traffic, and parking are key considerations as our community continues to evolve. We recognize that many of you have questions about the Town Center Plan and urban renewal. To start, I'd like to provide a big-picture overview of the Town Center Plan and the ideas currently being explored to bring our vision to life.

The Town Center Plan, adopted in 2019, establishes a long-term vision shaped by a two-year public engagement process involving residents, business owners, and community stakeholders. Through this effort, the community identified key priorities such as safe access and connectivity, welcoming public gathering spaces, economic vitality, and thoughtful, high-quality design.

For many years, Wilsonville residents have expressed a desire for a more vibrant and active Town Center—a place to gather, shop, dine, walk, and connect close to home. The plan provides more opportunities to support small businesses and enjoy entertainment in Wilsonville without leaving town.

Located in the heart of our city, the Town Center area encompasses more than 100 acres surrounding Wilsonville Road and Town Center Loop. It includes local businesses, housing, parks, City Hall, the Wilsonville Community Center, and the Oregon Korean War Memorial.

To help bring this vision to life, the City Council is considering urban renewal as a potential funding tool for Town Center improvements.

Urban renewal can help fund roads, utilities, parking, and pedestrian improvements that support redevelopment. Importantly, urban renewal does not increase taxes. Instead, it uses future tax growth dollars in the Town Center area to invest in new projects within Town Center. Schools, fire services, and other taxing districts continue receiving the same revenues they receive today.

In May, Wilsonville voters approved Measure 3-632, requiring voter approval before any new urban renewal district can be created. The City Council is considering placing a measure on the November 2026 ballot asking voters to establish an Urban Renewal District for the Town Center area. In June, the City also conducted polling to better understand community awareness of the Town Center vision and interest in a potential urban renewal district.

Looking ahead, residents can follow updates through the City's social media channels, the Boone's Ferry Messenger, and wilsonvilletowncenter.com. Key information including polling results and details related to housing, parking, and more will be shared over the summer.

Our community holds a wide range of perspectives on what the Town Center should become, and that diversity of thought is important. This effort is about finding a path forward that reflects the values of Wilsonville while preparing for the future. My team and I are committed to keeping you informed and listening to your feedback every step of the way.

Thank you for staying engaged and continuing to share your voice as we shape the future of our Town Center together.

As mayor, one of the things I value most about Wilsonville is that we remain a community where people continue to show up for one another.

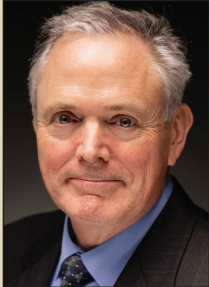
We see it in volunteers who give their time to local organizations and events.

Because democracy and strong communities do not sustain themselves automatically. They endure because people continue to care for them, participate in them, and believe they are worth strengthening for the future.

I continue to believe Wilsonville reflects the best of that spirit.

- Only use fireworks on outdoor, paved surfaces.
- Never aim fireworks at buildings, vehicles, people, or pets!
- Never alter fireworks or make your own!
- Never pick up or try to re-light a “dud.”

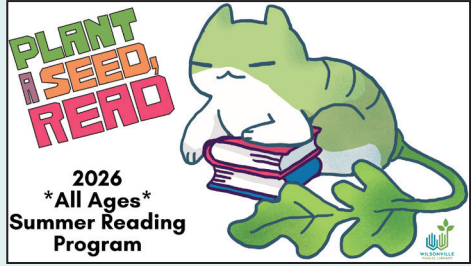

City Celebrates Pride with Community, Creativity, and Connection

Wilsonville’s Pride Celebration on June 13 brought the community together at Town Center Park for an afternoon celebrating inclusion, visibility, and connection. Hosted by the City’s Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee, the event welcomed residents, families, and visitors to celebrate and support the LGBTQIA+ community in an open and welcoming setting.

The program featured performances by Poison Waters and Friends, music by DJ SM4SH, and opportunities for community engagement. Congresswoman Andrea Salinas spoke to the crowd about the importance of pride, and Basic Rights Oregon Executive Director Kyndall Mason provided a keynote address that encouraged reflection and emphasized the importance of belonging and community support.

Attendees of all ages participated in activities across the park, including decorating bikes and showcasing Pride-themed attire, with prizes recognizing creativity and expression. Community members also



visited booths hosted by local organizations and sponsors, creating opportunities for connection and conversation.

A highlight of this year’s event was the addition of “Ride with Pride,” a group bike ride organized by SMART Transit. Participants gathered at Sofia Park in Villebois and rode together to Town Center Park, creating a visible and shared moment of celebration before joining the larger event.

Candidates May Now File to Run in 2026 General Election

In the Nov. 3, 2026, general election, registered Wilsonville voters are seating two individuals on the five-member City Council. The current terms of Council President Caroline Berry and Councilor Sam Scull end on Dec. 31, 2026. Both Berry and Scull are eligible to seek new four-year terms. To be eligible to serve as a City Councilor, all prospective candidates must:

- Be a United States citizen.
- Have residence within Wilsonville city limits for at least 12 months prior to the election date.
- Be registered to vote (City Council races are nonpartisan)

Candidate filing opened June 3, 2026. Prospective candidates are encouraged to schedule an

appointment as soon as possible to review deadlines, required paperwork, and other details. Contact Kimberly Veliz, City Recorder, at cityrecorder@wilsonvilleoregon.gov or 503-570-1506.

To allow time for verification and, if needed, collection of additional signatures, submit signature sheets to the City Recorder:

- Strongly recommended filing deadline is August 11, 2026, for elected incumbent candidates.
- Final filing deadline is August 18, 2026, for elected incumbent candidates.
- Strongly recommended filing deadline is August 18, 2026, for new and non-elected incumbent candidates.

- Final filing deadline is August 25, 2026, for new and non-elected incumbent candidates.

POLICE CHIEF’S CORNER

A Season of Recognition

In the last couple of months, Wilsonville residents and it’s police officers have earned significant recognition. I wanted to take time this month to highlight some of these most recent accolades.

In April 2026, Detective Chad Kyser was recognized at the Oregon Child Abuse and Human Trafficking Summit Awards Ceremony. Chad received the Beacon Award for his work protecting children and supporting survivors. Named in memory of Clackamas County Sheriff Detective Jeff Burlew, the Beacon Award honors professionals who serve as a guiding light through service, leadership, and a sustained commitment to multidisciplinary teamwork. Kyser was selected by his peers for leading by example, mentoring others, and consistently strengthening coordination among agencies responding to child abuse and human

trafficking cases.

Through his efforts, Kyser has helped reduce barriers to justice, enhance coordinated responses to complex cases, and improve outcomes for children and families. His work reflects a strong commitment to safeguarding vulnerable populations and advancing effective, team-based approaches to child protection.

In June, Wilsonville’s very own School Resource Officer (SRO), Zack Keirse, was nominated for the Floyd Ledbetter SRO of the year award presented by the National Association of School Resource Officers (NASRO). There were hundreds of nominations from across the country for this award and Zach was one of two finalists. Although he did not receive the award, this nomination and recognition by NASRO

Save Water, Save Money, Support Our Community

As summer approaches and outdoor water use increases, Wilsonville residents are encouraged to take simple steps to conserve water and protect this essential resource. Across the region, millions of gallons of water are used every day, making conservation a shared responsibility.

Water use at home often rises significantly during the warmer months, sometimes doubling or even tripling due to landscape watering. Small changes, however, can make a meaningful difference. For many households, the bathroom is the largest source of water use, and upgrading to efficient fixtures such as low-



flow toilets, faucets, and showerheads can reduce consumption while lowering utility costs.

Identifying and fixing leaks can also save water. Even a small drip from a faucet, toilet, or irrigation system can waste a surprising amount of water over time. Routine maintenance and quick repairs can prevent unnecessary waste and help keep water bills in check.

Outdoor watering is one of the most significant opportunities for conservation. Over watering lawns and gardens is a common issue. The community can improve efficiency by adjusting sprinkler systems, watering in the evening or early morning when there is less evaporation, watering only when needed, and measuring how much water irrigation systems actually use. Choosing native or climate-adapted plants is another effective strategy, as these species typically require less water and maintenance while still creating vibrant landscapes.

Beyond the home, simple daily choices can also make an impact. Sweeping driveways instead of pressure washing, using a shut-off nozzle when washing a car or choosing commercial car washes that recycle water can reduce waste and help protect local waterways from pollution. If you do choose to wash your car at home, use biodegradable soap to reduce pollution in our streams and wetlands.

Water conservation is a collective effort that benefits both current residents and future generations. By making small, thoughtful changes at home and in everyday routines, the Wilsonville community can help ensure a reliable water supply while supporting a healthy and sustainable environment.

Notable Actions: City Boards and Commissions		
City Council	Action	What it Means
June 15	Council directed staff to draft an ordinance for Planning Commission and City Council approval to eliminate waivers to increase building height in Town Center.	This would establish firmer maximum 3–5 story height limits and reduce exceptions, creating more predictable and consistent development standards.
June 15	Council adopted Resolution No. 3272 certifying election results and approving Measure 3-632 into the City Charter.	Voters must now be notified and approve any creation of or substantial changes to Urban Renewal Plans.
June 15	Council directed staff to prepare draft updates to nuisance regulations addressing livability issues.	The City is working toward stronger rules on property upkeep and vegetation to improve community standards.
June 1	The Council adopted the City’s budget for the 2026-27 fiscal year, which begins on July 1.	The all-funds budget of \$300.4 million was approved for the Council’s consideration by the Budget Committee on May 12.
June 1	In conjunction with passage of the budget, the Council adopted two resolutions that confirm Wilsonville’s eligibility and election to receive state-shared revenues totaling more than \$2.8 million.	This action provides \$780,000 for the General Fund and about \$2.06 million of gas-tax revenues for the Road Operating Fund, which funds City street maintenance projects.
June 1	The Council approved the allocation of about \$98,000 to fund six Community Enhancement Projects. Metro funds the Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Program to offset the impacts of the Ridder Rd. waste processing plant operated by Republic Services; the City receives \$1 per ton of waste processed locally.	This year’s beneficiaries include the Wilsonville Library Foundation, the Wilsonville Historical Society, Wilsonville High School Associated Student Body (ASB), and the Charbonneau Community Foundation as well as the City’s Tourism Promotion Committee and its Arts, Culture, and Heritage Commission.
June 1	After a public hearing, on first reading, the Council adopted amendments to Development Code and to Chapter 2 of City Code to ensure that the City’s residential land use review processes comply with State law and to advance the City’s Housing Production Strategy.	Recommended by the Planning Commission, this action clarifies the scope of applications eligible for review by the Development Review Board (DRB). It includes a restructuring of the DRB to one single seven-member panel effective in 2027.
May 18	The Council adopted the Tourism Development Committee five-year action plan and one-year implementation plan.	This action advances Wilsonville’s Tourism Development Strategy, which includes the ExploreWilsonville.com website.
May 18	The Council authorized a \$299,000 contract with Jacobs Engineering Group Inc. to fund Phase 1 of the Aeration Basin Expansion Project at the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP).	This project phase identifies a preferred expansion alternative. Upon construction, the project adds a fourth basin and a seventh blower to the aeration basin facility and makes seismic improvements.

Briefs

Oregon Tech Students Showcase Innovation at IDEAfest

Students from Oregon Tech showed their work at the Portland-Metro IDEAfest Project Symposium June 2. The event gave students a chance to present projects that solve real-world problems and show what they have learned in their programs.

The top award for Best Overall Presentation and Poster went to CryoFlux: Remote-Controlled Dual-Loop Liquid Cooling System for Environmental Chamber Testing, a project by Electrical Engineering students Chris Hardwick, Garth Crawford, and Youstina Reyad. Industrial computing systems generate significant heat under high workloads, and CryoFlux uses a liquid-cooling system to cool the computers under test.

Judges also selected runner-up winners for top poster and top presentation.



The award for Best Poster went to EV Bike Pub Restoration and Repair, created by Renewable Energy Engineering students Andre Fraslin and Adam Briggs. Their project redesigned an electric pub bike, using a hybrid electric drivetrain with solar charging capability. The upgrades improve reliability and allow the bike to run longer while using both human and electric power.

The award for Best Presentation went to Mid-Drive E-Bike Conversion Kit Pedal Assist Control System, developed by Mechanical Engineering students Kyle Isom, Patrick Francisco, and Nicholas Aleshire. Their project turns a standard mountain bike into a pedal-assist, motor-powered bike using a low-cost kit that is easy to install and remove.

The IDEAfest symposium highlights the strong technical skills of Oregon Tech students. It also helps students build experience in presenting their work and explaining how their ideas can be used in the real world.

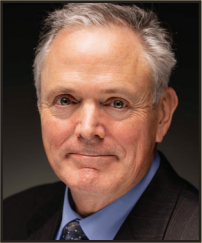
